



The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), is the lead agency responsible to plan and administer child care subsidies funded by the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG). This work is done by the Child Care Subsidy Program (CCSP), in the Office of Child and Family Services (OCFS) https://www.maine.gov/dhhs/ocfs.

The Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014 enhances statutory development and school success; and supports parents who work or in training or education. The CCDBG Act also supports parent and family member involvement in the development of their children in child care settings. As the lead agency, Maine DHHS assists this effort by sharing consumer education details about child care services to parents and families to help them make informed choices.

What is the Child Care Subsidy Program (CCSP)?

The CCSP is a statewide program supporting eligible families with paying child care.

The Child Care Subsidy Program:

- Helps eligible families pay for child care if they work, go to school, attend a job training program, or are retired and the legal guardian of a child;
- Ensures the health and safety of children in child care;
- Provides equal access to high quality child care for families with low income; and
- Enhances the quality of child care and the early childhood workforce.

Three ways to apply for the CCSP:

- 1. Complete the application found at https://www.maine.gov/dhhs/ocfs/support-for-families/child-care/paying-for-child-care; or
- 2. Call OCFS 1-877-680-5866 or 207-624-7999, Monday-Friday, 8:00am-5:00pm; or

Note: Do not bring your completed application to a DHHS Office.

OCFS staff will review your application to:

- Determine if you are eligible for the program; and/or
- Approve the child care provider you chose.

Important CCSP Income and Eligibility Guidelines:

- ❖ All families must meet income guidelines at or below eighty-five percent (85%) of the State Median Income.
- ❖ For families with more than one (1) child in care, the youngest child is always considered the first child enrolled.
- ❖ Parent(s) enrolled in job training or an educational program must prove enrollment the first time they fill out an application and when redetermined. They must attend classes in person or online.
- ❖ If a parent is income eligible and provides documents from the Social Security Administration (SSA) or the MaineCare Medical Review Team, identifying a disability that makes them: 1. Unable to take care of the child(ren); 2) unable to work and the other parent is working, attending an job training or education program, the family may be eligible for the CCSP.
- ❖ If a child is home-schooled, the parent is not eligible to receive child care subsidy during regular school hours, as defined within their school district.





- ❖ If funding available, DHHS may waive the employment, job training or educational program requirements; and approve CCSP for no longer than twelve (12) months, for:
 - o At-risk children;
 - o A child involved in an open child protective case;
 - o A child in care and custody; or
 - o A child placed under the legal guardianship of a person who is at retirement age.
- ❖ If you receive benefits like Maine Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), ASPIRE or MaineCare, the process for applying for and renewing these benefits through the Office for Family Independence (OFI) is the same.

- All parents are assessed a parent fee. The parent fee is determined by the:
 - o Number of individuals in the family;
 - o Gross income or allowable net income; and
 - o Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) level of the child care program.
- The parent fee does not vary with the:
 - o Number of children receiving child care services:
 - o Amount of child care services they need; or
 - o Type of child care services the parent chooses to use.





Background Checks and Child Care Providers

To meet federal and state requirements for all Child Care Providers delivering direct care services, OCFS conducts a criminal background check, which includes fingerprinting. There is no cost to providers for this process. Child Care Provider Background Checks | Department of Health and Human Services (maine.gov)

Child Care Providers are required to request background checks with the use of fingerprinting for themselves and their staff to include:

- All licensed child care facilities:
- Licensed family Child Care Providers; and
- CCSP license-exempt Child Care Providers (excluding CCSP relative child care providers).

Per Federal law (45 C.F.R. § 98.43) the following individuals must submit to background checks with the use of fingerprinting described below:

- All adults (18 years and older) residing in the location where child care services are being provided;
- Any individuals whose activities involve the care or supervision of children or who have unsupervised access to children; and
- ❖ The Child Care Provider him or herself.

The following registries, repositories, and databases are checked for each individual for whom a background check is requested, with the mandatory use of fingerprints described below:

- ❖ National Crime Information Center National Sex Offender Registry https://www.fbi.gov/services/cjis/ncic#File-Types and Federal Bureau of Investigation fingerprint check (using Next Generation Identification).
- In the State where the individual resides: State child abuse and neglect registry/database, State Bureau of Identification (SBI) https://www.maine.gov/dps/Sbi/crime repository with fingerprints, and State Sex Offender Registry https://www.nsopw.gov/.
- In each State where the individual has resided at any time during the previous five (5) years: State child abuse and neglect registry/ database, SBI or comparable State agency's crime repository (with or without fingerprints), and State Sex Offender Registry.

Individuals must schedule an appointment for fingerprinting. All individuals must complete the above requirement every five (5) years. Once completed, individuals will receive a letter from the OCFS stating whether the individual is eligible or ineligible **and** a letter to provide to current or prospective employers.

Who can be a Child Care Provider?

- Licensed child care centers:
- Licensed family child care homes:
- An adult who provides care in their own home;
- ❖ An adult who come to your home to provide care; and
- ❖ A relative over 18 years of age.

Process for Licensing Child Care Providers: Children's Licensing and Investigation Services (CLIS)

CLIS ensures child care provider programs are safe and healthy environments, provide care and supervision, and engage in developmentally appropriate activities to meet each child's physical and emotional needs. CLIS monitors compliance with regulations set by the DHHS under direction of the Maine Legislature. CLIS licenses and monitors: Family Child Care Homes, Child Care Centers, and Nursery Schools. Monitoring and Inspecting Child Care Providers

CLIS provides monitoring inspection reports for each on-site visit to **licensed** child care and **license-exempt** programs. This report outlines any health and safety violations and includes action step(s) the child care program took to correct the violation(s).

Quality for ME – Maine's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS)

Maine's Quality for ME provides parents a way to easily identify high quality childhood and education programs. QRIS is based on four (4) steps, each step leading to higher quality. Step 4 is the highest step a program/provider can achieve. All licensed child care programs in Maine, (family child care, child care centers, school age programs) are eligible to take part after being in operation for one year. Families can use QRIS to guide their choices for quality child care. CCSP Licensed Providers must be at least a Step 1 on the QRIS. - Maine Child Protection Services receives complaints called into the statewide Child Protective Services Intake hotline. Child Care Licensing Specialists are assigned to the daily complaint intake. Calls come to the main number for Child Care Licensing and transferred to the Child Care Licensing Specialist. Any parental complaints can be reported to the DHHS by phone, fax, or email. - Mandated Reporters are a critical early warning network to identify suspected child abuse and neglect; quickly enough to avoid serious and long-term damage to a child. Professionals who frequently meet children in their work are in the best position to recognize and report suspected child abuse and neglect. They are required by law to do so. The OCFS runs the statewide hotline for child abuse and neglect. Mandated Reporters call this hotline to make a report. Staff guide callers through the process of making a report of suspected abuse and neglect. The hotline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
